 - o Article VI. Meetings:
 - Section 1 Amendment: "A Co-Chair may also call for a vote outside of regular meetings on a resolution that needs immediate attention. This vote may be conducted through a channel chosen by the co-chair, including virtual as long as it meets the requirements set forth in Section 2.
 - Section 2 Amendment: "For votes raised online/email, quorum is met when half plus one of the members have voted. Co-chairs must leave at least three days for review and comment on the resolution being voted on."
 - C. Remove: "2. Once these members are identified, they must fill out the Position Questionnaire. 3. After the Questionnaire is complete, email the completed Questionnaire to a Council Co-Chair and ask to add the request for SFPC position to the next full Council meeting agenda for discussion and vote.

 Suspended work requirements for able-bodied adults without dependents (ABAWDs) during pandemic Advocates are working on a policy fix that would allow participation in both SNAP and FDPIR simultaneously for Native Americans SNAP delivery available, but currently only 6 states Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) – States can issue temporary EBT cards to low-income families missing out on free and reduced-price school meals. As of 4/14 only 9 states submitted P-EBT plans and 2 are approved. Hunger Free CO Updates:

- Emergency allotments For March and April, households will receive emergency allotments that will temporarily bring benefit up to max
- (\$646 monthly for a household of four)
- Certification Period Extensions SNAP households with recertifications or periodic reports due in March April or May, do NOT need to submit this paperwork, as their certification periods have been extended by six months
- o Roberto Meza is now working with Hunger Free Colorado
- SFPC and JeffCO SNAP group meeting every other week for updates doing a weekly SNAP briefing we can send out
- Updates Farmer/Producer Supports
 - Mile High Farmers (MHF) compiled list of local farms with product available
 - $\circ~$ MHF is also updating their website, creating online access to farmers and product
- USDA announced funding for farmers
- RE: Vision Update:
 - Providing three warm meals each day for families from 12:00-1:00. Currently serving ~150/day
 - \circ 100 meals delivered to a nursing home on a daily basis
 - Food boxes can be picked up on Wednesdays, distributed over 500 boxes, delivery is available for people who cannot drive up
 - Guests are asked to fill out a short form with required information, also providing help for anyone requiring assistance to fill out the form
 - \circ $\,$ Meals and boxes include information about SNAP.
 - If you know of a provider with information to distribute please reach out to have that info included in the boxes
 - o If you know families that live in the Westwood neighborhood or nearby, please refer them to Yuridia or Re:Vision
 - Seeking funding to continue providing meals at the current rate

- Immigrant Agriculture Group Update:
 - o Food systems workers are lacking support in federal funding. Working to get support for workers
 - \circ Article summarizing the federal changes in money can be found <u>here</u>
 - o Many workers are undocumented but considered essential workers
 - o Immigrant activists are focused on detained immigrants and not able to focus on immigrant farm workers and packaging workers
 - o Pursuing solutions at the state level and whether the Governor's powers allow him to address this
 - o Looking at data which currently exists and what is needed
 - o Funding to support immigrant food workers
 - Short term policy recommendations
 - o Working on a letter and website to inform on issues
 - \circ $\;$ Asking council and members to sign on in support of the letter $\;$
- Regional Infrastructure Update
 - Understanding where we have influence regarding policy making and political reach
 - o Thinking strategically to understand where we can have the most impact

- DDPHE/City Update
- 9,730 cases and 422 deaths in CO
- 1,880 cases and 97 deaths in Denver

- The rate of growth is slowing
- The city of Denver has spent 6 million in COVID-19 response
- Shelters for people experiencing homelessness have been established at the National Western Stockshow (Men) and the Coliseum (Women & Trans), as well as over 600 hotel rooms have been secured for protective action
- Demand for food at pantries has doubled and, in some cases, gone up 5-10 times normal demand
- Holding food provider calls on Fridays to provide updates and understand needs of the providers in the metro region
